| NEIGHBORHOOD SPOTLIGHT: UPTOWN

170 Mercer Street is located in the Uptown Neighborhood, which is one of Seattle's Urban Centers. It is situated across the street from the Seattle Center, a 74-acre arts, educational, tourism and entertainment event center. A landmark in the center is the 605 foot tall Space Needle. Recently the city has completed the renovation of the Coliseum building, currently called the Climate Pledge Arena and is the home of the NHL's Seattle Kraken Hockey Club and other sport teams, plus it accommodates roughly 100 other events over the year.

The neighborhood accommodates residential and office use quite well. The commercial center of the neighborhood is at Queen Anne Avenue and Mercer Street, which is three blocks to the west of the site. A QFC store, The Metropolitan Market and a Safeway store are located within three blocks of the site. There are a number of restaurants in the area and a number of arts and entertainment venues within walking distance of the site. The Gates Foundation Headquarters is located three blocks to the east and Amazon's headquarters is located less than a mile to the south. The South Lake Union District, is a mile to the east, has been redeveloped over the last ten years and is home to a number of tech and research companies. The city, via creative rezoning within the neighborhoods has encouraged development of housing, jobs and attractions of regional significance.
